AN ACT Relating to voter registration procedures; amending RCW 1 2 29A.08.010, 29A.08.030, 29A.08.107, 29A.08.110, 29A.08.115, 29A.08.125, 3 29A.08.145, 29A.08.210, 29A.08.250, 29A.08.330, 29A.08.520, 29A.08.651, 29A.08.710, 29A.08.720, 29A.08.775, 29A.40.091, 29A.84.140, 46.20.118, 4 and 46.20.155; reenacting and amending RCW 29A.08.740; adding a new 5 6 section to chapter 10.64 RCW; adding new sections to chapter 29A.08 7 RCW; repealing RCW 29A.08.155 and 29A.08.730; and providing an effective date. 8

9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. A new section is added to chapter 10.64 RCW 11 to read as follows:

12 When a person is convicted of a felony, the court shall require the 13 defendant to sign a statement acknowledging that:

14 (1) The defendant's right to vote has been lost due to the felony 15 conviction;

16 (2) If the defendant is registered to vote, the voter registration 17 will be canceled;

18 (3) The right to vote may be restored by:

(a) A certificate of discharge issued by the sentencing court, as
 provided in RCW 9.94A.637;

3 (b) A court order issued by the sentencing court restoring the 4 right, as provided in RCW 9.92.066;

5 (c) A final order of discharge issued by the indeterminate sentence 6 review board, as provided in RCW 9.96.050; or

7 (d) A certificate of restoration issued by the governor, as 8 provided in RCW 9.96.020; and

9 (4) Voting before the right is restored is a class C felony under 10 RCW 29A.84.660.

11 **Sec. 2.** RCW 29A.08.010 and 2004 c 267 s 102 are each amended to 12 read as follows:

As used in this chapter: "Information required for voter registration" means the minimum information provided on a voter registration application that is required by the county auditor in order to place a voter registration applicant on the voter registration rolls. This information includes ((the applicant's)):

18 <u>(1) Name((, complete residence));</u>

19 (2) Residential address((-));

20 (3) Date of birth((-));

21 (4) Washington state driver's license number((-)) or Washington 22 state identification card <u>number</u>, or the last four digits of the 23 applicant's <u>Social Security number((-)) if the applicant does not have</u> 24 <u>a Washington state driver's license or Washington state identification</u> 25 <u>card;</u>

26 (5) A signature attesting to the truth of the information provided 27 on the application((τ)); and

28 (6) A check or indication in the box confirming the individual is
 a United States citizen.

30 If the individual does not have a driver's license, state 31 identification card, or Social Security number, the registrant must be issued a unique voter registration number ((and)) in order to be placed 32 on the voter registration rolls. All other information supplied is 33 ancillary and not to be used as grounds for not registering an 34 applicant to vote. Modification of the language of the official 35 36 Washington state voter registration form by the voter will not be 37 accepted and will cause the rejection of the registrant's application.

1 **Sec. 3.** RCW 29A.08.030 and 2004 c 267 s 104 are each amended to 2 read as follows:

3 The definitions set forth in this section apply throughout this 4 chapter, unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

5 (1) "Verification notice" means a notice sent by the county auditor 6 or secretary of state to a voter registration applicant and is used to 7 verify or collect information about the applicant in order to complete 8 the registration. The verification notice must be designed to include 9 <u>a postage prepaid, preaddressed return form by which the applicant may</u> 10 <u>verify or send information.</u>

(2) "Acknowledgement notice" means a notice sent by nonforwardable mail by the county auditor or secretary of state to a registered voter to acknowledge a voter registration transaction, which can include initial registration, transfer, or reactivation of an inactive registration. An acknowledgement notice may be a voter registration card.

17 (3) "Confirmation notice" means a notice sent to a registered voter by first class forwardable mail at the address indicated on the voter's 18 permanent registration record and to any other address at which the 19 county auditor or secretary of state could reasonably expect mail to be 20 21 received by the voter in order to confirm the voter's residence 22 address. The confirmation notice must be designed ((so that the voter 23 may update his or her current residence address)) to include a postage 24 prepaid, preaddressed return form by which the registrant may verify the address information. 25

26 **Sec. 4.** RCW 29A.08.107 and 2004 c 267 s 106 are each amended to 27 read as follows:

(1) The secretary of state must review the information provided by 28 each voter registration applicant to ensure that ((either)) the 29 provided driver's license number, state identification card number, or 30 31 ((the)) last four digits of the Social Security number match the information maintained by the Washington department of licensing or the 32 Social Security administration. If a match cannot be made, the 33 secretary of state or county auditor must correspond with the applicant 34 to resolve the discrepancy. 35

36 (2) If the applicant fails to respond to any correspondence 37 required in this section to confirm information provided on a voter

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registration application((-)) within ((thirty)) forty-five days, the applicant will not be registered to vote. The secretary of state shall forward the application to the appropriate county auditor for document storage.

(3) Only after the secretary of state has confirmed that ((an 5 the provided driver's license number, state 6 applicant's)) 7 identification card number, or ((the)) last four digits of the applicant's Social Security number match existing records with the 8 of 9 Washington department licensing or the <u>S</u>ocial <u>S</u>ecurity administration, or determined that the applicant does not have 10 ((either)) a driver's license number, state identification card number, 11 12 or <u>Social</u> <u>Security</u> number may the applicant be placed on the official 13 list of registered voters.

14 (4) In order to prevent duplicate registration records, all complete voter registration applications must be screened against 15 existing voter registration records in the official statewide voter 16 registration list. If a match of an existing record is found in the 17 official list, the record must be updated with the new information 18 provided on the application. If the new information indicates that the 19 voter has changed his or her county of residence, the application must 20 21 be forwarded to the voter's new county of residence for processing.

22 Sec. 5. RCW 29A.08.110 and 2004 c 267 s 107 are each amended to 23 read as follows:

24 (1) ((On receipt of an application for voter registration, the county auditor shall review the application to determine whether the 25 26 information supplied is complete.)) An application is considered complete only if it contains the applicant's name, complete valid 27 residence address, date of birth, ((and)) signature attesting to the 28 truth of the information provided, a mark in the check-off box 29 confirming United States citizenship, and an indication ((the license 30 information)) that the provided driver's license number, state 31 identification card number, or Social Security number has been 32 confirmed by the secretary of state. If it is not complete, the 33 34 auditor shall promptly mail a verification notice of the deficiency to 35 the applicant. This verification notice shall require the applicant to 36 provide the missing information. If the verification notice is not returned by the applicant within forty-five days or is returned as 37

undeliverable ((the auditor shall not place)), the name of the applicant shall not be placed on the ((county voter)) official list of registered voters. If the applicant provides the required verified information, the applicant shall be registered to vote as of the original date of mailing ((of the original voter registration application)) or date of delivery, whichever is applicable.

7 (2) ((In order to prevent duplicate registration records, all complete voter registration applications must be screened against 8 existing voter registration records in the official statewide voter 9 registration list. If a match of an existing record is found in the 10 official list the record must be updated with the new information 11 12 provided on the application. If the new information indicates that the 13 voter has changed his or her county of residence, the application must be forwarded to the voter's new county of residence for processing. If 14 the new information indicates that the voter remains in the same county 15 of residence or if the applicant is a new voter the application must be 16 17 processed by the county of residence.

18 (3)) If the information required in subsection (1) of this section is complete, the applicant is considered to be registered to vote as of 19 the <u>original</u> date of mailing <u>or date of delivery</u>, whichever is 20 21 applicable. The auditor shall record the appropriate precinct date 22 identification, taxing district identification, and of registration on the voter's record in the state voter registration 23 24 list. Within forty-five days after the receipt of an application but 25 no later than seven days before the next primary, special election, or general election, the auditor shall send to the applicant, by first 26 27 class mail, an acknowledgement notice identifying the registrant's precinct and containing such other information as may be required by 28 the secretary of state. The postal service shall be instructed not to 29 forward a voter registration card to any other address and to return to 30 the auditor any card which is not deliverable. ((If the registrant has 31 32 indicated on the form that he or she is registered to vote within the county but has provided a new address within the county that is for 33 voter registration purposes, the auditor shall transfer the voter's 34 35 registration.

36 (4))) (3) If an acknowledgement notice card is properly mailed as 37 required by this section to the address listed by the voter as being 38 the voter's mailing address and the notice is subsequently returned to the auditor by the postal service as being undeliverable to the voter at that address, the auditor shall promptly send the voter a confirmation notice. The auditor shall place the voter's registration on inactive status pending a response from the voter to the confirmation notice.

6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 6. A new section is added to chapter 29A.08 RCW 7 to read as follows:

No person registering to vote, who meets all the qualifications of 8 a registered voter in the state of Washington, shall be disgualified 9 because of a nontraditional address being used as a residence address. 10 Voters using such an address will be registered and assigned to a 11 precinct based on the location provided. Voters without a traditional 12 address will be registered at the county courthouse, city hall, or 13 other public building near the area that the voter considers his or her 14 15 residence. Registering at a nontraditional address will not disqualify 16 a voter from requesting ongoing absentee voter status if the voter 17 designates a valid mailing address.

For the purposes of this section, "nontraditional address" includes shelters, parks, or other identifiable locations that the voter deems to be his or her residence.

21 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 7. A new section is added to chapter 29A.08 RCW 22 to read as follows:

(1) If a voter who registered by mail indicates on the voter registration form that he or she does not have a Washington state driver's license, Washington state identification card, or Social Security number, he or she must provide one of the following forms of identification the first time he or she votes after registering:

(a) Valid photo identification;

(b) A valid enrollment card of a federally recognized Indian tribein Washington state;

31 (c) A copy of a current utility bill;

32 (d) A current bank statement;

33 (e) A copy of a current government check;

34 (f) A copy of a current paycheck; or

35 (g) A government document that shows both the name and address of 36 the voter.

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1 (2) If the voter fails to provide one of the above forms of 2 identification prior to or at the time of voting, the ballot must be 3 treated as a provisional ballot regardless of whether the voter is 4 voting at a poll site or by mail. The ballot may only be counted if 5 the voter's signature on the outside envelope matches the signature in 6 the voter registration records.

7 (3) The requirements of this section do not apply to an out-of8 state, overseas, or service voter who registers to vote by signing the
9 return envelope of the absentee ballot.

10 **Sec. 8.** RCW 29A.08.115 and 2004 c 267 s 108 are each amended to 11 read as follows:

12 A person or organization collecting voter registration application 13 forms must transmit the forms to the secretary of state or a 14 ((designee)) county auditor at least once weekly. <u>The registration</u> 15 <u>date on such forms will be the date they are received by the secretary</u> 16 <u>of state or county auditor.</u>

17 Sec. 9. RCW 29A.08.125 and 2004 c 267 s 110 are each amended to 18 read as follows:

19 (1) Each county auditor shall maintain a computer file containing 20 a copy of each record of all registered voters within the county 21 contained on the official statewide voter registration list for that 22 county.

(2) The secretary of state shall at least quarterly review and
 update the records of all registered voters on the official statewide
 voter registration data base to make additions and corrections.

26 (3) The computer file must include, but not be limited to, each 27 voter's last name, first name, middle initial, date of birth, residence 28 address, gender, date of registration, applicable taxing district and 29 precinct codes, and the last date on which the individual voted.

30 <u>(4)</u> The county auditor shall subsequently record each consecutive 31 date upon which the individual has voted and retain all such 32 consecutive dates.

33 **Sec. 10.** RCW 29A.08.145 and 2004 c 267 s 113 are each amended to 34 read as follows:

35 This section establishes a special procedure which an elector may

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use to register to vote or transfer a voter registration by changing 1 2 his or her address during the period beginning after the closing of registration for voting at the polls under RCW 29A.08.140 and ending on 3 the fifteenth day before a primary, special election, or general 4 5 election. A qualified elector in the state may register to vote or change his or her registration address in person in the office of the 6 7 county auditor of the county in which the applicant resides, or at a voter registration location specifically designated for this purpose by 8 9 the county auditor ((of the county in which the applicant resides)) or secretary of state, and apply for an absentee ballot for that primary 10 or election. The auditor or registration assistant shall register that 11 individual in the manner provided in this chapter. The application for 12 an absentee ballot executed by the newly registered or transferred 13 voter for the primary or election that follows the execution of the 14 registration shall be promptly transmitted to the auditor with the 15 16 completed voter registration form.

17 Sec. 11. RCW 29A.08.210 and 2003 c 111 s 216 are each amended to 18 read as follows:

An applicant for voter registration shall complete an application providing the following information concerning his or her qualifications as a voter in this state:

(1) The address of the last former registration of the applicant asa voter in the state;

- 24 (2) The applicant's full name;
- 25 (3) The applicant's date of birth;
- 26 (4) The address of the applicant's residence for voting purposes;

(5) The mailing address of the applicant if that address is not thesame as the address in subsection (4) of this section;

29 (6) The sex of the applicant;

30 (7) <u>The applicant's Washington state driver's license number or</u> 31 <u>Washington state identification card number, or the last four digits of</u> 32 <u>the applicant's Social Security number if he or she does not have a</u> 33 <u>Washington state driver's license or Washington state identification</u> 34 <u>card;</u>

35 (8) A check box for the applicant to indicate that he or she does
36 not have a Washington state driver's license, Washington state
37 identification card, or Social Security number;

- 1 (9) A check box allowing the applicant to indicate that he or she
 2 is a member of the armed forces, national guard, or reserves, or that
 3 he or she is an overseas voter;
- 4 (10) A check box allowing the applicant to confirm that he or she
 5 is at least eighteen years of age;
- 6 (11) Clear and conspicuous language, designed to draw the
 7 applicant's attention, stating that the applicant must be a United
 8 States citizen in order to register to vote;
- 9 (12) A <u>check box and</u> declaration <u>confirming</u> that the applicant is 10 a citizen of the United States;
- 11
- (((8))) <u>(13) The following warning:</u>

12 <u>"If you knowingly provide false information on this voter</u> 13 <u>registration form or knowingly make a false declaration about your</u> 14 <u>qualifications for voter registration you will have committed a class</u> 15 <u>C felony that is punishable by imprisonment for up to five years, a</u> 16 <u>fine of up to ten thousand dollars, or both."</u>

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(14) The following affirmation by the applicant:

18 <u>"By signing this document, I hereby assert, under penalty of</u> 19 perjury, that I am legally eligible to vote. If I am found to have 20 voted illegally, I may be prosecuted and/or fined for this illegal act. 21 In addition, I hereby acknowledge that my name and last known address 22 will be forwarded to the appropriate state and/or federal authorities 23 if I am found to have voted illegally."

24 (15) The oath required by RCW 29A.08.230 and a space for the 25 applicant's signature; and

26 (((-9))) (16) Any other information that the secretary of state 27 determines is necessary to establish the identity of the applicant and 28 prevent duplicate or fraudulent voter registrations.

This information shall be recorded on a single registration form to be prescribed by the secretary of state.

If the applicant fails to provide the information required for voter registration, the auditor shall send the applicant a verification notice. The ((auditor shall not register the)) applicant <u>may not be</u> <u>registered</u> until the required information is provided. If a verification notice is returned as undeliverable or the applicant fails to respond to the notice within forty-five days, the ((auditor shall not register the)) applicant <u>shall not be registered</u> to vote. 1 ((The following warning shall appear in a conspicuous place on the 2 voter registration form:

3 "If you knowingly provide false information on this voter 4 registration form or knowingly make a false declaration about your 5 qualifications for voter registration you will have committed a class 6 C felony that is punishable by imprisonment for up to five years, or by 7 a fine of up to ten thousand dollars, or both imprisonment and fine."))

8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 12.** A new section is added to chapter 29A.08 9 RCW to read as follows:

10 (1) When a felony offender has completed all the requirements of 11 his or her sentence, the county clerk shall immediately transmit this 12 information to the secretary of state along with information about the 13 county where the conviction occurred and the county that is the last 14 known residence of the offender. The secretary of state shall maintain 15 such records as part of the elections data base.

16 (2) If the offender has completed all the requirements of all of 17 his or her sentences for all of his or her felony convictions, the 18 secretary of state shall transmit information about the restoration of 19 the former felon's voting rights to the county auditor where the 20 conviction took place and, if different, the county where the felon was 21 last known to reside.

22 **Sec. 13.** RCW 29A.08.250 and 2004 c 267 s 117 are each amended to 23 read as follows:

24 The secretary of state shall furnish registration forms necessary to carry out the registration of voters as provided by this chapter 25 26 without cost to the respective counties. ((All voter registration forms must include clear and conspicuous language, designed to draw an 27 28 applicant's attention, stating that the applicant must be a United 29 States citizen in order to register to vote. Voter registration 30 application forms must also contain a space for the applicant to provide his or her driver's license number or the last four digits of 31 his or her social security number as well as check boxes intended to 32 allow the voter to indicate age and United States citizenship 33 eligibility under the Help America Vote Act of 2002 (P.L. 107-252).)) 34

1 Sec. 14. RCW 29A.08.330 and 2003 c 111 s 224 are each amended to 2 read as follows:

3 (1) The secretary of state shall prescribe the method of voter 4 registration for each designated agency. The agency shall use either 5 the state voter registration by mail form with a separate declination 6 form for the applicant to indicate that he or she declines to register 7 at this time, or the agency may use a separate form approved for use by 8 the secretary of state.

(2) The person providing service at the agency shall offer voter 9 registration services to every client whenever he or she applies for 10 service or assistance and with each renewal, recertification, or change 11 12 of address. The person providing service shall give the applicant the 13 same level of assistance with the voter registration application as is 14 offered to fill out the agency's forms and documents, including information about age and citizenship requirements for 15 voter registration. 16

17 (3) <u>The person providing service at the agency shall determine if</u> 18 <u>the prospective applicant wants to register to vote or transfer his or</u> 19 <u>her voter registration by asking the following question:</u>

20 <u>"Do you want to register to vote or transfer your voter</u> 21 <u>registration?"</u>

22 If the applicant chooses to register or transfer a registration,
23 the service agent shall ask the following:

24

<u>(a) "Are you a United States citizen?"</u>

25 (b) "Are you or will you be eighteen years of age on or before the 26 <u>next election?"</u>

If the applicant answers in the affirmative to both questions, the agent shall then provide the applicant with a voter registration form and instructions and shall record that the applicant has requested to register to vote or transfer a voter registration. If the applicant answers in the negative to either question, the agent shall not provide the applicant with a voter registration form.

33 (4) If an agency uses a computerized application process, it may, 34 in consultation with the secretary of state, develop methods to capture 35 simultaneously the information required for voter registration during 36 a person's computerized application process. 1 (((4))) <u>(5)</u> Each designated agency shall provide for the voter 2 registration application forms to be collected from each agency office 3 at least once each week. The agency shall then forward the application 4 forms to the secretary of state each week. The secretary of state 5 shall forward the forms to the county in which the applicant has 6 registered to vote no later than ten days after the date on which the 7 forms were received by the secretary of state.

8 Sec. 15. RCW 29A.08.520 and 2004 c 267 s 126 are each amended to 9 read as follows:

10 (1) Upon receiving official notice of a person's conviction of a felony in either state or federal court, if the convicted person is a 11 12 registered voter in the county, the county auditor shall cancel the defendant's voter registration. Additionally, the secretary of state 13 in conjunction with the department of corrections, the Washington state 14 patrol, the office of the administrator for the courts, and other 15 16 <u>appropriate state agencies</u> shall arrange for a ((periodic)) <u>guarterly</u> comparison of a list of known felons with the statewide voter 17 registration list. If a person is found on ((the department of 18 corrections)) a felon list and the statewide voter registration list, 19 20 the secretary of state or county auditor shall confirm the match 21 through a date of birth comparison and ((cancel)) suspend the voter registration from the official state voter registration list. 22 The 23 canceling authority shall send ((notice of the proposed cancellation)) 24 to the person at his or her last known voter registration address <u>a</u> 25 notice of the proposed cancellation and an explanation of the 26 requirements for restoring the right to vote once all terms of sentencing have been completed. If the person does not respond within 27 thirty days, the registration must be canceled. 28

29 (2) The right to vote may be restored by, for each felony 30 conviction, one of the following:

31 (a) A certificate of discharge issued by the sentencing court, as 32 provided in RCW 9.94A.637;

(b) A court order restoring the right, as provided in RCW 9.92.066; (c) A final order of discharge issued by the indeterminate sentence

35 review board, as provided in RCW 9.96.050; or

36 <u>(d) A certificate of restoration issued by the governor, as</u> 37 provided in RCW 9.96.020. 1 Sec. 16. RCW 29A.08.651 and 2004 c 267 s 101 are each amended to 2 read as follows:

3 (1) The office of the secretary of state shall create and maintain 4 a statewide voter registration data base. This data base must be a 5 single, uniform, official, centralized, interactive computerized 6 statewide voter registration list defined, maintained, and administered 7 at the state level that contains the name and registration information 8 of every legally registered voter in the state and assigns a unique 9 identifier to each legally registered voter in the state.

10 (2) The computerized list must serve as the single system for 11 storing and maintaining the official list of registered voters 12 throughout the state.

13 (3) The computerized list must contain the name and registration 14 information of every legally registered voter in the state.

(4) Under the computerized list, a unique identifier is assigned toeach legally registered voter in the state.

(5) The computerized list must be coordinated with other agency data bases within the state, including but not limited to the department of corrections, the department of licensing, ((and)) the department of health, the Washington state patrol, and the office of the administrator for the courts. The computerized list may also be coordinated with the data bases of election officials in other states.

(6) Any election officer in the state, including any local election officer, may obtain immediate electronic access to the information contained in the computerized list.

26 (7) All voter registration information obtained by any local 27 election officer in the state must be electronically entered into the 28 computerized list on an expedited basis at the time the information is 29 provided to the local officer.

30 (8) The chief state election officer shall provide support, as may
31 be required, so that local election officers are able to enter
32 information as described in subsection (3) of this section.

(9) The computerized list serves as the official voter registrationlist for the conduct of all elections.

35 (10) The secretary of state has data authority on all voter 36 registration data.

37 (11) The voter registration data base must be designed to 38 accomplish at a minimum, the following:

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1 (a) Comply with the Help America Vote Act of 2002 (P.L. 107-252);

(b) Identify duplicate voter registrations;

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(c) Identify suspected duplicate voters;

(d) Screen against the department of corrections, the Washington
state patrol, and other appropriate state agency data bases to aid in
the cancellation of voter registration of felons, of persons who have
declined to serve on juries by virtue of not being citizens of the
United States, and of persons determined to be legally incompetent to
vote;

10 (e) Provide up-to-date signatures of voters for the purposes of 11 initiative signature checking;

(f) Provide for a comparison between the voter registration database and the department of licensing change of address data base;

14 (g) Provide online access for county auditors with the goal of real 15 time duplicate checking and update capabilities; and

16 (h) Provide for the cancellation of voter registration for persons 17 who have moved to other states and surrendered their Washington state 18 drivers' licenses.

19 (12) In order to maintain the statewide voter registration data 20 base, the secretary of state may, upon agreement with other appropriate 21 jurisdictions, screen against data bases maintained by election 22 officials in other states and data bases maintained by federal agencies 23 including, but not limited to, the federal bureau of investigation, the 24 federal court system, the federal bureau of prisons, and the bureau of 25 citizenship and immigration services.

(13) The secretary of state shall retain information regarding
 previous successful appeals of proposed cancellations of registrations
 in order to avoid repeated cancellations for the same reason.

29 (14) The secretary of state must review and update the records of 30 all registered voters on the computerized list on a quarterly basis to 31 make additions and corrections.

The county auditor <u>or</u> <u>secretary of state</u> shall promptly furnish current lists ((or mailing)

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labels)) of registered voters in his or her possession, at actual 1 2 reproduction cost, to any person requesting such information. The lists ((and labels)) shall not be used for the purpose of mailing or 3 delivering any advertisement or offer for any property, establishment, 4 5 organization, product, or service or for the purpose of mailing or delivering any solicitation for money, services, or anything of value. б 7 However, the lists and labels may be used for any political purpose. 8 The county auditor or secretary of state must provide a copy of RCW 29A.08.740 to the person requesting the material that is released under 9 10 this section.

13 (1) Any person who uses registered voter data furnished under RCW 29A.08.720 ((or 29A.08.730)) for the purpose of mailing or delivering 14 advertisement or offer for 15 anv any property, establishment, organization, product, or service or for the purpose of mailing or 16 17 delivering any solicitation for money, services, or anything of value is guilty of a class C felony punishable by imprisonment in a state 18 correctional facility for a period of not more than five years or a 19 20 fine of not more than ten thousand dollars or both such fine and 21 imprisonment, and is liable to each person provided such advertisement or solicitation, without the person's consent, for the nuisance value 22 of such person having to dispose of it, which value is herein 23 24 established at five dollars for each item mailed or delivered to the 25 person's residence. (2) Each person furnished data under RCW 29A.08.720 ((or 1 2 29A.08.730)) shall take reasonable precautions designed to assure that the data is not used for the purpose of mailing or delivering any 3 advertisement or offer for any property, establishment, organization, 4 5 product, or service or for the purpose of mailing or delivering any solicitation for money, services, or anything of value. However, the 6 7 data may be used for any political purpose. Where failure to exercise due care in carrying out this responsibility results in the data being 8 9 used for such purposes, then such person is jointly and severally 10 liable for damages under subsection (1) of this section along with any other person liable under subsection (1) of this section for the misuse 11 12 of such data.

Only voters who appear on the official statewide voter registration list are eligible to participate in elections. Each county shall maintain a copy of that county's portion of the state list. The county must ensure that data used for the production of poll lists and other lists and mailings done in the administration of each election are ((drawn from)) the same as the official statewide voter registration list.

22 **Sec. 21.** RCW 29A.40.091 and 2004 c 271 s 135 are each amended to 23 read as follows:

The county auditor shall send each absentee voter a ballot, a 24 25 security envelope in which to seal the ballot after voting, a larger envelope in which to return the security envelope, and instructions on 26 how to mark the ballot and how to return it to the county auditor. The 27 instructions that accompany an absentee ballot for a partisan primary 28 29 must include instructions for voting the applicable ballot style, as 30 provided in chapter 29A.36 RCW. The absentee voter's name and address must be printed on the larger return envelope, which must also contain 31 32 a declaration by the absentee voter reciting his or her qualifications and stating that he or she has not voted in any other jurisdiction at 33 34 this election, together with a summary of the penalties for any 35 violation of any of the provisions of this chapter. A summary of the applicable penalty provisions of this chapter 8 must be printed on the return envelope immediately adjacent to the 9 10 space for the voter's signature. The signature of the voter on the return envelope must affirm and attest to the statements regarding the 11 12 qualifications of that voter and to the validity of the ballot. The 13 return envelope must also have a secrecy flap that the voter may seal that will cover the voter's signature and optional telephone number. 14 For out-of-state voters, overseas voters, and service voters, the 15 signed declaration on the return envelope constitutes the equivalent of 16 17 a voter registration for the election or primary for which the ballot has been issued. The voter must be instructed to either return the 18 ballot to the county auditor by whom it was issued or attach sufficient 19 first class postage, if applicable, and mail the ballot to the 20 21 appropriate county auditor no later than the day of the election or 22 primary for which the ballot was issued.

If the county auditor chooses to forward absentee ballots, he or 23 24 she must include with the ballot a clear explanation of the qualifications necessary to vote in that election and must also advise 25 a voter with questions about his or her eligibility to contact the 26 27 county auditor. This explanation may be provided on the ballot envelope, on an enclosed insert, or printed directly on the ballot 28 itself. If the information is not included, the envelope must clearly 29 indicate that the ballot is not to be forwarded and that return postage 30 31 is guaranteed.
