AN ACT Relating to implementing a comprehensive approach to suicide prevention and behavioral health in higher education, with enhanced services to student veterans; adding new sections to chapter 28B.20 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 28B.77 RCW; creating a new section; and providing an expiration date.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

7 NEW SECTION. (1) Washington has been a leader in Sec. 1. addressing suicide as a public health issue. The legislature intends 8 9 for Washington to continue its leadership by supporting the creation of comprehensive suicide prevention and behavioral health initiatives 10 for postsecondary students. In 2015, the legislature created the 11 12 mental health and suicide prevention in higher education task force. 13 The task force was charged with determining the policies, resources, 14 and technical assistance needed to support postsecondary institutions improving access to behavioral health services and improving 15 in 16 suicide prevention responses. In November 2016, the task force issued 17 on mental health and suicide prevention in higher its report education. 18

19 (2) According to the task force report:

(a) The 2005 American college health assessment survey found thatnine and one-half percent of students seriously considered suicide,

1 one and one-half percent of students nationwide have attempted suicide, and less than twenty percent were in treatment. According to 2 the 2015 American college health association national college health 3 assessment, seventy-five percent of postsecondary students reported 4 feeling overwhelmed and thirty percent reported feeling so depressed 5 б it was difficult to function. More than one-third of students 7 reported anxiety as negatively impacting academics and almost onequarter said depression negatively impacted academics; 8

9 (b) There is incomplete data on suicide deaths among Washington's 10 postsecondary students and the availability of behavioral health 11 resources on Washington's campuses. There is currently no statewide 12 system in place to track this data;

13 (c) Lack of funding for behavioral health resources across all 14 sectors is the largest barrier to providing services for 15 postsecondary students statewide;

(d) Due to funding constraints, the level of professional mental and behavioral health counseling is often limited for postsecondary institutions in all sectors. For example, six institutions in the public two-year sector servicing nearly fifty thousand students have either no professional mental health providers to counsel students or have such limited resources that the counselor to student ratio was as low as one to nearly eight thousand five hundred in 2014-2015.

(3) The legislature also recognizes that, as of 2016, there were 23 over sixteen thousand student veterans and dependents enrolled in 24 25 Washington's community and technical colleges, and approximately four 26 thousand veterans and dependents enrolled in Washington's four-year institutions of higher education. The legislature recognizes that the 27 risk for suicide is significantly higher among veterans when compared 28 to nonveteran adults in the United States and that student veterans 29 face unique challenges and often have vastly different 30 life 31 experiences from traditional students. According to a study presented 32 a few years ago at an annual convention of the American psychological association, almost half of military veterans who are enrolled in 33 college have contemplated suicide at some point and twenty percent 34 have planned to kill themselves. 35

36 (4) The legislature intends to implement task force 37 recommendations by:

38 (a) Creating a publicly available statewide resource for39 postsecondary institutions;

40 (b) Developing and centralizing data collection; and

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1 (c) Creating a grant program for resource-challenged institutions to help develop suicide prevention programs in those institutions, 2 which may include for example, enhancing treatment services to 3 student veterans; creating campus-wide crisis services; expanding 4 existing crisis plans to integrate suicide intervention; reentry, 5 6 including medical leave that supports reentry; postvention; and creating links and referral systems between campus behavioral health 7 resources and community-based mental health resources. 8

9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 28B.20 10 RCW to read as follows:

(1) Subject to availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, an entity within the University of Washington school of social work that has expertise in suicide prevention, in collaboration with the student achievement council, shall develop a statewide resource for behavioral health and suicide prevention for the state's postsecondary institutions.

17 (2) To establish the components of the statewide resource, the 18 entity shall convene and consult with a work group that consists of 19 representatives from stakeholder groups the entity deems appropriate. 20 The entity must consider representatives from those organizations 21 listed in the mental health and suicide prevention in higher 22 education task force, created by chapter 67, Laws of 2015. At a 23 minimum, the stakeholders in the work group must include:

(a) Representation from a tribal college;

25 (b) Representation from a veterans training support center;

26 (c) Representation from students and families;

(d) Representatives selected by the educational opportunity gap
 oversight and accountability committee;

(e) Representation from a community behavioral health provider;

- 30 (f) A suicide prevention expert;
- 31

(g) Representation from the department of health; and

32 (h) Three institutional counseling center directors or executive 33 directors to include one from each of the following: A public four-34 year college or university, a private, nonprofit institution, and a 35 community and technical college.

36 (3) The entity must be responsible for constructing and hosting 37 the statewide resource and linking the resource to the student 38 achievement council's and the department of health's web sites.

39 (4) At a minimum, the statewide resource must:

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(a) Be made publicly available through a web-based portal or a
 support line;

3 (b) Provide a free curriculum to train faculty, staff, and 4 students in suicide recognition and referral skills and in the 5 specific needs of student veterans;

6 (c) Provide a resource to build capacity within the institutions 7 to train individuals to deliver training in person;

8 (d) Contain model crisis protocols, per sector, that include 9 behavioral health and suicide identification, intervention, reentry, 10 and postvention;

(e) Contain model marketing materials and messages that promote student behavioral health on college campuses;

(f) Develop capacity for an annual conference for postsecondary institutions seeking to address students' behavioral health and suicide prevention needs. The entity must be responsible for hosting the first conference for postsecondary institutions; and

17 (g) Include resources that will serve diverse communities and 18 underrepresented populations, including resources that are culturally 19 relevant.

20 (5) The statewide resource must be made available to 21 postsecondary institutions by June 30, 2020.

22 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 28B.77 23 RCW to read as follows:

(1) Subject to availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the suicide prevention in higher education grant program is established. The purpose of the grant program is to provide funding to postsecondary institutions for the institutions to create partnerships with health care entities to provide mental health, behavioral health, and suicide prevention to students in their institutions.

31 (2)(a) The council shall administer the grant program in accordance with this section and in collaboration with the work group 32 convened by the entity within the University of Washington school of 33 social work specified under section 2 of this act. The council shall 34 establish minimum criteria that grant recipients must meet to be 35 awarded a grant. The grant program must be implemented by November 1, 36 37 2019.

38 (b) The council must award the first six grants created under 39 this section to public institutions of higher education. When

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1 selecting the recipients of the first six grants under this subsection, the council must consult with the state board for 2 community and technical colleges. The council must identify which 3 public institutions of higher education have the greatest need, have 4 a clear and strong demonstration of willingness from leadership to 5 б utilize the statewide resources created under section 2 of this act, 7 and can develop partnerships to enhance capacity. From those identified public institutions of higher education, proposals that 8 enhance treatment services to student veterans must be given 9 priority. Once the first six grants are awarded, the council may 10 11 award grants to other postsecondary institutions that meet the 12 council's criteria.

13 (3) For the purposes of this section, "postsecondary 14 institutions" means institutions of higher education as defined in 15 RCW 28B.10.016, degree-granting institutions as defined in RCW 16 28B.85.010, private vocational schools as defined under RCW 17 28C.10.020, and school as defined in RCW 18.16.020.

18 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. A new section is added to chapter 28B.20
19 RCW to read as follows:

(1) Beginning June 1, 2019, and every June 1st thereafter until 2022, postsecondary institutions shall submit a report to the entity 22 within the University of Washington school of social work specified 23 under section 2 of this act for the purposes of establishing a 24 baseline for behavioral health concerns and responses at the 25 institutions of higher education.

(2) The annual report must include the following information as reported to the postsecondary institution, in compliance with the entity's established data collection requirements, and if an institution does not collect or have access to the information it must indicate this in the report:

(a) The awareness of students, faculty, and staff regarding
 behavioral health and suicide prevention resources;

33 (b) The institution's counselor-to-student ratio;

34 (c) The number of students referred to off-campus behavioral 35 health providers;

36 (d) The number of students identifying emotional distress as 37 reasons for withdrawal;

38 (e) The number of student suicide deaths;

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1 (f) The number of student suicide attempts that result in 2 hospitalization;

3 (g) Information about dissemination of material to students about
4 behavioral health resources that are available on and off campus;

5 (h) Confirmation of campus plans for suicide recognition and 6 referral training that identifies groups receiving the required 7 training and which groups are recommended to receive training in the 8 future;

9 (i) The entity or entities on campus responsible for the 10 development and maintenance of the campus crisis plan that integrate 11 policies for suicide identification, intervention, reentry, and 12 postvention;

13 (j) The campus point person or persons responsible for the crisis 14 plan; and

15 (k) Information about behavioral health services and supports16 available to veterans on campus.

17 (3) For purposes of this section, "postsecondary institutions" 18 has the same meaning as that term is defined in section 3 of this 19 act.

20 (4) This section expires December 31, 2022.

21 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. A new section is added to chapter 28B.20 22 RCW to read as follows:

23 (1) By December 31, 2018, for the purposes of collecting data on suicide prevention and behavioral health in higher education, the 24 25 entity within the University of Washington school of social work specified under section 2 of this act shall identify data, methods 26 27 for data collection, and data definitions to be used by postsecondary institutions required to submit annual reports under section 4 of 28 this act. The entity shall collaborate with the postsecondary 29 30 institutions, as defined in section 3 of this act, in establishing data collection requirements and criteria. 31

32 (2) The entity shall aggregate the information it receives by 33 sector and, by December 1st of each year, the entity must submit an 34 aggregated summary report to the relevant committees of the 35 legislature. The entity shall serve as the depository for annual 36 reports submitted by institutions of higher education under section 4 37 of this act.
